Judge Harrington came to Clarendon from Rhode Island in 1786. He represented Clarendon in the Legislature in 1795 and from 1798 to 1803, serving as Speaker of the House the latter year. He was Chief Judge of Rutland County Court from 1801 to 1803. Harrington moved from the House Speakership to a position of Associate Justice of the Vermont Supreme Court. He held that post for ten years until his death in 1813. The tall granite monument that marks his resting place was erected in 1884 from a \$400.00 appropriation by the Vermont Legislature.

Judge Harrington's most famous decision occurred when a claimant came before his court to request a warrant for extradition of a runaway slave back to the South. After superficial evidence of ownership was provided, Judge Harrington intimated clear title to the slave was not satisfactorily established. A second volume of evidence still proved inconclusive. A third attempt resulted in the claimant producing an auction bill of sale for the slave. Still proper title was lacking. In frustration the claimant finally asked, "Will Your Honor then be good enough to suggest what is lacking to make a perfect title?" "A bill of sale, Sir, straight from god Almighty," was the reply, and the slave went free. This decision formed a landmark case, and achieved for him a national reputation at a time when slavery was popular even in some northern states.

**Notes to Financial Statements
December 31, 1981**

Note A — Significant Accounting Policies

With the exception of the lack of a statement of general fixed assets as noted below, the accounting policies of the Town of Clarendon, Vermont conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units. The following is a summary of the significant policies.

The accrual basis of accounting is followed by all funds other than the General Fund, which utilizes the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when incurred. Under the modified accrual method, revenues are recorded when received in cash, except for material or available revenues which are accrued to properly reflect the taxes levied and the revenues earned. In this respect, property taxes are accrued and reflected as earned in the year billed since they are considered available to meet expenditures in the related budget year.

The Equipment Fund does not include a statement of general fixed assets as required by generally accepted accounting principles. The Equipment Fund is used to set funds aside for future purchases of equipment. Fees transferred to the Fund are based on the use of equipment by the General Fund charged at rates determined by the Department of Highways of the State of Vermont less the cost of equipment operating expenses paid by the General Fund.

Note B — Delinquent Taxes

Delinquent taxes receivable are stated at the amount of taxes assessed less an allowance for amounts estimated to be uncollectible. The taxes receivable as of December 31, 1980 have been reduced by \$8,662 from that previously reported to reflect an additional provision for uncollectible taxes billed prior to January 1, 1981.

Note C — Tax Anticipation Loans

The tax anticipation loan as of December 31, 1981 is payable to Proctor Trust Company at an interest rate of 10% and matures on November 2, 1982. The loan as of December 31, 1980 carried an interest rate of 8.82% and matured on November 12, 1981.

1981 Clarendon Selectmen Report

In reviewing 1981, we look back on a year in which significant changes occurred and notable developments were made.

In early 1981, Steve Lanfear resigned as our Road Foreman and was replaced by Allen Carleton. Steve served on the road crew for eight years and as Foreman for about a year. We thank Steve for his service to the Town and welcome Allen as Road Foreman.

As a result of the efforts of the voters, the Selectmen and the Clarendon Industrial and Commercial Development Committee, the Selectmen entered into a contract with the Rutland Industrial Development Corporation (RIDC) and Rutland City for the development of the industrial park at the Airport. The plans call for construction to begin at the site this spring.

At the 1981 annual Town meeting, the Clarendon voters voted to withdraw from the Rutland County Solid Waste District. The District accepted our withdrawal. The Town's alternative to staying with the District was to enter into a contract with an independent solid waste contractor. As the lowest bidder, Ted Hubbard received that contract; to be effective February 15, 1982. Beginning on that date, a trash compactor will be available at the north side of the Town Hall every week on Thursdays from 12:00 Noon to 6:00 P.M. In addition to the compactor, Hubbard's Cold River Road Transfer Station will be available to Clarendon residents each Wednesday and Saturday from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. All Town residents may dump their trash at either the compactor or transfer station at times identified as long as they display a valid permit sticker. The stickers will be available at the Town Clerk's office.

At an earlier Town Meeting, the voters gave the Selectmen the authority to enter into tax stabilization agreements with farmers for additions to their agricultural property. This summer, the Selectmen developed a procedure that will stabilize taxes on agricultural properties. If anyone has any questions as to those procedures contact one of the Selectmen or our Administrative Assistant.

Russell Reay, our Tree Warden, has instituted a program to remove trees from our road right of ways that pose a liability to the Town and a hazard to our roadways. We appreciate Russ' efforts.

Just recently the Town's Board of Health adopted a new Health Ordinance, dealing with septic systems, to become effective March 29, 1982. Anyone can obtain a copy of this ordinance from the Town Clerk or by contacting our Health Officer, Robert Harrison.

The Board of Selectmen now act as the Town's Road Commissioner. In addition to the general maintenance of our roads, we had a couple of major repair projects. One was the rip-rap job on the Creek Road. The rip-rap was needed because the Otter Creek had washed away the bank right up to the

road shoulder. The other project involved the North Shrewsbury Road. Since there was clay in the road base, we had to dig up a portion of the road and replace the base with gravel.

The winter of 1981 caused the road crew to work many additional hours. We experienced four ice storms and had more snow than we had in at least four years. We feel the road crew has done a good job in keeping our roads safe in such adverse conditions.

The financial position of the Town continues to be hampered by the large amount of delinquent taxes. Our total delinquent taxes outstanding at December 31, 1981 were over \$121,000; of that amount \$61,443 are 1981 taxes that were not collected. With credit getting harder to obtain and interest rates continuing to stay high, our delinquent tax problem will have even more of an impact on our financial condition in the future. The Budget for 1982 reflects lean operations for the year. The Selectmen took every approach that we felt was necessary to keep taxes as low as possible without jeopardizing operations.

We wish to thank all the people that have been involved in the Town for 1981. It is these people that, through their efforts and hard work, keep the Town going for the benefit of all the Townspeople. We solicit your involvement and attendance at our regular scheduled Selectmen's meetings which take place the second and fourth Monday of each month.

Information Regarding Solid Waste Removal
Contract With Ted R. Hubbard

Compactor from 12:00 Noon to 6:00 P.M. — Thursdays at Town Hall.

These are the things that may be deposited at either the compactor or the transfer station at Cold River Road.

- (A) The term "Solid Waste" means any garbage, refuse or other discarded material, other than septage and sludge, including solid, liquid, semi-solid or contained gaseous materials as accumulated at private residences and apartments. These do not pertain to industrial, commercial, mining or agriculture operations. The term "Solid Waste" shall not include "hazardous waste", radioactive waste or "economic poison". Also shall not include motor vehicles.
- (B) Building materials of normal nature such as (Broken Cement,) brick, lumber, sheetrock, plywood, insulation, and other materials such as from demolition and construction of buildings, will be accepted by the Contractor only in minimal amounts at a price of One Dollar (\$1.00) per cubic yard, payable by said person dumping such materials.
 Contractor may refuse to accept such material from a resident of the amount if material exceeds six (6) cubic yards. Contractor states that if advance notice is given they will accept such materials in larger quantities. Two days (2) should be given to Contractor.
- (C) Furniture, including but not limited to, sofas, large chairs, recliners, mattresses and springs, will be accepted by the Contractor with payment of (50¢) fifty cents per item, payable by said person disposing of such waste. Also, large items or appliances will be accepted with the payment of (One Dollar) (\$1.00) per item, payable by said person disposing of such waste.

No Solid Waste will be accepted at Contractors Transfer Station unless a valid dump sticker issued by Town is presented.

Report of Tree Warden

The Town Tree Warden is charged by State statute, with the responsibility for the health, safety and appearance of trees within public rights-of-way. To fund this management, the selectmen allocated \$750 in 1981. Through competitive bidding the Rutland firm of Richard Rubino was selected to remove or prune approximately 25 of the most hazardous trees along town highways.

There is much to do before the "forest growth" along Clarendon roads is properly managed, and motorists can be fairly confident that debris from dead trees won't be falling in the roads. There are over 75 trees left to remove — mostly elms killed by Dutch elm disease, and sugar maples which have succumbed to old age, decades of tapping for sap, and road salt injury. The greatest concentration of trees to be removed are the willows along the Alfrecha Road. After two or three years of substantial appropriations for tree removal, the large inventory of hazardous trees will be eliminated. Thereafter, a modest sum will take care of the dozen or so trees which will die annually. Landowners should be aware that they are legally entitled to the wood whenever a roadside tree is pruned or cut down adjacent to their property.

The town does not plan to undertake a program of thinning, pruning, or harvesting roadside stands of trees, but such cultural practices improve the health and appearance of our shade trees. Interested landowners should contact the county forester's office of the Vermont Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation for recommendations.

RUTLAND REGIONAL COMMISSION REPORT 1981

The Rutland Regional Commission is a public planning and development agency whose governing board is comprised of representatives from communities in Rutland County. The RRC is a good investment of local government funds! For every dollar of local contribution, the Commission has generated in excess of \$10 more for programs which serve all of us. In addition, we are involved in a variety of programs producing loans and grants in the County which multiply that amount several-fold. The emphasis of the Commission is on assistance to member communities and, when appropriate, seeking regional solutions to common problems.

In the current year our program breaks into five basic categories:

Transportation — implementing a transit center program for Vermont Transit Lines, the Bus and other surface transportation; management and technical assistance to the Bus Co.'s updating the 1975 Transportation Plan for the region including help for towns with highway problems; a work ride-sharing program; and seeking state legislative support for improved highways in Rutland County.

Economic Development — research and planning; including an industrial sites survey program for many Rutland County communities; and a high technology industry locational study.

Solid Waste Disposal — substantial work with the Rutland County Solid Waste District on a sanitary landfill, resource recovery plant development, and implementation of a recycling program.

Historic Building Preservation and Renovation — assistance to communities on historic preservation programs, including work for the Fair Haven Village Green Historic District for building reconstruction, and the Rutland Downtown Development Corp.

Local Assistance and Services — to member communities for such items as town plans, flood plain zoning, management, capital improvement programming, maps and aerial photos, grant applications, and training sessions for local officials on various municipal subjects. The Commission was involved in initiating, administering and financially supporting the recently completed Rutland Region 20/20 project which involved the efforts of over 200 community leaders, looking to the year 2000 and developing long-term specific recommendations for the region's future. It supported the regional sewer program for Rutland City and Town, Mendon and Sherburne; and this year became an Affiliate Census Data Center. Support services are provided to the Rutland County Health Council.

We have been pleased to assist Clarendon this year with development of your town plan, assistance on recreational matters, work on the Airport Industrial Park and assistance to the Industrial and Commercial Development Committee in preparing a promotional brochure for industrial develop-

ment. With the help of your Commissioner, Mr. Brownson Spencer, we hope to be of even greater service to Clarendon and the region.

III Superintendent's Report

A. Enrollment:

As can be seen from the above enrollment tables our elementary school enrollment continues to decrease slightly and the high school enrollment shows another increase. For next year it appears that both could be down slightly. If this does in fact happen it could have a negative impact on the amount of state aid we receive.

B. Personnel:

This year (1981-82) our teaching staff has one new member, George Jackson, who replaces Nelson Jaquay who has taken a leave of absence. Monika Pitts, an assistant in the resource room last year, is presently teaching grade 1 for Patricia Quenneville, who is also on a leave of absence. A list of all teachers and staff members appears at the beginning of this annual report.

C. Curriculum:

Mrs. Solomka and her staff continue to review all instructional materials and programs to keep them up-to-date and viable. This past year they have done a great deal of work on activity centers, a technique for motivating students and individualized instruction. A program for gifted and talented students, started last year, continues under a grant from the State. We have also started introducing students to the world of microcomputers through a federal grant which enabled us to purchase several machines.

D. Kindergarten:

Contained in this year's warning are two articles on the establishment of a kindergarten. Perhaps the weakest link in our educational program in Clarendon is the lack of a kindergarten. The help which the school can provide to youngsters at this early age is extremely important and for many students if this help is not provided at this early age, they will be at a disadvantage throughout their entire school years. I would strongly encourage you to support this program. It will cost taxpayers the first year. However, starting with the second year we will receive an additional amount of state aide which will more than pay for the cost of the program. If we had had a kindergarten of 40 students last year we would have received \$30,000.00 in additional state aide this year. The addition of a kindergarten program is sound, both educationally and financially. A proposed budget for the first year follows:

Transportation would be provided one way by the school district and parents would have to make arrangements for the other trip.

E. School Building:

We have just completed replacing the roof over the open classroom area. This had been giving us serious problems for some time. The new roof is a single ply membrane roof which is especially designed for flat roofs in cold climates such as ours. In the very near future it will be necessary to replace other sections of the old roof. This past year we also replaced the carpet and ceiling in the open classroom area because of extensive water damage. To help conserve energy we have added insulation to all of the ceilings.

F. Budget Analysis

There is a complete outline of the proposed budget for the 1982-83 school year included in the enclosed financial statement. This proposed budget has total expenditures of \$524,183.00 including the proposed \$5,000.00 for the building maintenance sinking fund. The major increases are as follows:

To support this budget it will be necessary to raise \$57,973.00 in taxes, which includes the \$5,000.00 for the building sinking fund, but does not include money for a new kindergarten program.
